The general public is more than welcome to visit and use the library with the price of admission.

The Eleanor Squire Library is a circulating library specializing in horticultural, botanical, and gardening resources. Members may check out items for three weeks. Rare books do not circulate. Staff, trustees, and volunteers can check out storage and reference books for short-term loans at the discretion of the librarian.

The rare book collection of the Eleanor Squire Library represents some of the major contributions to botanical and horticultural literature. Tours are occasionally scheduled for members and the public. Enjoy a historical overview of the books, offering a unique glimpse into the scope and diversity of the Library's 2000 volumes and featuring selections from the collections of Warren Corning and Thomas Urban.

The Ingalls Library mission is to support the museum's current and future collections, research, exhibitions, publications, lectures, programs, and activities. The archives' mission is to preserve records that document the origins, development, achievements, and activities of the museum, and to administer the museum's records management program.

All library materials, except those in the reference collection, are housed in closed stacks and must be requested for retrieval at the circulation desk for use in the reading room.

The Harold T. Clark Library consists of more than 20,000 books and a 40,000-plus periodical collection that includes over 3,000 individual titles. Holdings focus on natural history and science topics that reflect the Museum's interests and ongoing research initiatives. Public access is by appointment only.

The Library also possesses a 1,000-volume Rare Book Collection kept in secure, environmentally controlled compacted storage. The collection includes works by John James Audubon, John Gould, and Edward Curtis.

Kelvin Smith Library welcomes individuals who have personal research needs, and offers on-shelf collections for browsing, reading, and photocopying. Our primary mission is to support the teaching and learning activities of the Case faculty, staff, and students and while the majority of our computers require the Case network ID logon, we reserve some Guest computers for the public's research needs. The Kulas Music Library is a satellite library of Kelvin Smith Library. It houses Case Western Reserve University's library collections in the area of music. The library contains 45,000 items, including music scores, books on music, sound recordings, video recordings, microforms and music periodicals. The library also contains a listening room for using the sound recording and video collections.

The Freedman Center is a partnership between the College of Arts and Sciences and the Kelvin Smith Library. Established in 2005, with over 2,700 square feet of highly functional workspace and state-of-the-art equipment, the Freedman Center harnesses the power of modern technology and combines it with the driver of academic creativity.
